
A Blessing

Reflection

Teenagers. The response of the vineyard keeper's two sons is just what we would expect teenagers to do. One goes off in a huff after being asked to do something. "Aren't I old enough now to decide what I am going to do with my day without you telling me?" he thinks. The other is sneaky and seems like he always does what his parents ask him to do, when in fact he doesn't.

Jesus draws his listeners in through a familiar example. He speaks to us too in ways that we understand through our experiences and the words of those around us. He speaks to us as we meditate on his word. God speaks to all cultures and nations in ways that they

understand. Recently some of the youth joined in with *Reach Out* and learnt about reaching out to others whose backgrounds are different to their own. High on the list is **to love first**. To put someone else first often involves personal sacrifice. I watch some of our helping hands in the church who do this regularly. They put



themselves out to help others even if it is a bit hard to do. And a big thank you to those who have helped me on many occasions and recently.

Then we need **to pray** when reaching out to others to share our good news. Our prayers must be humble, honest, and outward looking. They should not be like the religious rulers of Jesus' day who thought they knew it all, who thought they were already doing God's word. We need to be open to learn to love others as God would have us do. Before we open our mouths or do something, are we sure that this is what God



wants us to say or do? Are we growing closer to God through reading his word each day and meditating, praying and listening to God's message to us?

Then we need **to speak**. This could be a risky business. It was for John who sacrificed his time living at home with his family. He had to share God's word of preparation. God amazingly brought people to hear John. And they did. They repented of their wrong doings - and don't we

all have those - and they followed God's message, especially that preached by John, as he pointed towards Jesus. So, they then followed Jesus. God speaks to all of us but we do need to listen.

God wants us to share his message of love and care for his people and for his creation to those who have not yet had the opportunity to hear his word.



Perhaps this is on account of their cultural background or their circumstances, considering what their family thinks; what they do on Sunday; what has to be done to be culturally correct; and what they want to do. (We might fit in here too).

Feel confident after you have loved and prayed that you can and should speak out, so that others may come to know God's word. We can share Jesus' story.

When Paul wrote to the **Philippians in 2:1-13**, these people now had encouragement, comfort, fellowship, tenderness and compassion for one another. They were urged to sacrifice like God had done, even though they knew it would not be easy under Roman rule and under threat of persecutions. Are we, like Jesus, human? Not expecting equality with God? Content in serving others, humbly and exalting God? God transforms us. We need to trust in God that we may continue to live in a way that reflects the life of Jesus.
