Reflection

Who do you owe? And for what?

This can be a daunting prospect to consider as we don't like being in debt but I'm sure none of us can say that we have done everything without the aid of others. After all, every baby is born helpless and needs to be cared for. I know I owe my parents a great debt of gratitude for the way they brought me up and all the sacrifices they made to feed, clothe and educate me. I can also think of others: teachers, workmates, friends and family who have given to me in so many ways and made me a better person.

And God has been gracious to me too. Whatever happens I have always known God's love and peace. All these things have no market value but are beyond price.

We also have debts that can be measured in dollars and cents, ones that have an actual and exact amount. Some are momentary, like the cup of coffee that you buy; some come every year, like licences and insurance; some are ongoing, think of the taxes we pay in the supermarket or as a worker; and some are a long term commitment – mortgages can take years to repay.

When the Herodians (the ones on the side of the Romans) and the Pharisees came together is was an unusual pairing as these two groups usually didn't have anything in common – they were on opposite sides of the fence. Such was their desire to get rid of Jesus that they worked together to trap him with an either/or question – about debts.

But if any laughing was done it was Jesus as he deftly turned the tables on them with a both/and answer. Like us, Jesus lived in a society with both items that could be bought and the priceless grace of God in existence. Like us, Jesus knew that both were necessary for life.

Jesus was wise enough to get them to answer their own question. If they then had an issue, they then had to sort it out amongst themselves. I'd love to have been a fly on the wall when they got back and had to explain what happened!
