

Reading: John 20:1-18

Reflection

What have you eaten a lot of today – maybe lovely, chocolate eggs? Eggs have come to be a symbol of Easter because they contain life. They remind us of the tomb, which contained not death but life - contained the news that Jesus was alive again in a very special way. On that first Easter morning those who arrived first at the tomb expected to see Jesus' dead body and couldn't understand why the tomb was empty. Actually, the gospel reading portrays a very strange way to begin Easter – Mary is confused by the missing body. Peter does not know what to make of an empty tomb. Then the other disciple believes, but he and Peter go home as though nothing has happened. How extraordinary.

But the weeping Mary remains. She turns round and sees someone she thinks is the gardener. What a strange Easter story so far! And yet, isn't that what gives the story credibility? Because we are left with the distinct impression that John is describing a struggle on that first Easter morning. A great struggle of the mind and soul and a struggle to come to grips with something that defies human comprehension.



Mary struggles and we all struggle because we all are limited by what the world around teaches us to see and to know and to believe. The world teaches that death is final, that some situations are hopeless, that human beings are on their own. Someone once wrote that we live in a world in which most of our efforts are focussed on managing, knowing, ordering and controlling. These efforts can leave us hopeless and weary because they are dependent on our resources, our strategies, our interests, and our definitions - sadly, believing we are on our own.

Mary weeps, she is grieving loss. This situation seems hopeless. She believes that she is on her own. The disciples lost their courage and are in hiding, out of the eyes of the authorities both Roman and Jewish. Then Jesus speaks her name: "Mary". He is calling her beyond the limitations that the world has placed on her knowing, her believing. At that moment, Mary discovered that she was not on her own. Mary discovered, as we discover also, that there is One who is with us in death and in life. Not just anyone, but the very One who raised Jesus from the dead and who has the power to do that for you and for me as well.

Easter celebrates that good is stronger than evil.

Love triumphs over hate.

Life conquers death.

Grief and doubt give way to faith and thankfulness.

Believe then - Christ is risen.

He is risen indeed!
